

A Few Notes To Remember

- The City Chamberlain's office is open daily from 8-3 and closed from 12-1 for lunch.
- The 2026 City Budget passed, which reflects a 5.3% tax increase.
- There will be no increase in water and sewer rates for 2026. Water Service charges will increase.
- There is no overnight parking though April 15, 2026 on designated streets.
- City offices will be closed on January 1, 2026 and we will be closing at 3PM on New Year's Eve.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT UPDATE



As we step into a new year, I wanted to share a few updates from the Planning & Development Department—and also say how grateful I am to be part of the City of Oneida. Even though I'm still relatively new here, I continue to meet residents and business owners who truly care about the future of this community, and that has been one of the best parts of the job.

Downtown Revitalization Progress

Our Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) projects continue moving forward. Hotel Oneida is making steady progress on their interior work as they prepare for their building permit, and several other projects are lining up for activity in early 2026. Momentum is building downtown, and it's exciting to see.

Business Assistance Fund - Reopened!

We have officially reopened the Downtown Business Assistance Fund (BAF), which supports business and property owners in the downtown target area. This program can help with projects such as:

- Façade renovations
- Permanent signage and awnings
- Interior renovations and leasehold improvements
- Permanent machinery and equipment for businesses

The program offers matching grants up to \$100,000, typically covering 50% of total project costs, with the opportunity to receive up to 75% coverage for applicants who complete approved small-business training. This is a reimbursement program, meaning work must be completed before funds are disbursed. Applications are available at the City Clerk's Office or on the <u>City website</u>.

Comprehensive Plan Update

We recently signed the contract with Barton & Loguidice to begin work on the City's new Comprehensive Plan. This long-range planning document will guide Oneida's growth, development patterns, infrastructure, and community priorities for the next decade and beyond. Work will begin early in 2026, and we'll keep residents informed as the process moves forward.



A Fun Observation (and a Community Opportunity!)

Since arriving in Oneida, I've noticed something interesting: we don't currently have a dry cleaner in the city. For a community our size, that's a service many families and professionals could really use. If you or someone you know has ever considered opening a dry-cleaning or laundry service, now might be a great time to explore it. The Business Assistance Fund could even support certain aspects of getting a downtown location ready.

Looking Ahead

Between active DRI projects, refreshed funding for small business improvements, the launch of the Comprehensive Plan, and ongoing conversations with prospective developers, there's a lot to be optimistic about in 2026. Thank you to everyone who continues to invest time, energy, and creativity into Oneida's future. Wishing you all a Merry Christmas and a warm and hopeful start to the new year!

SNOW PLOW SAFETY



TIPS:

- Snow plows have limited visibility—stay cautious and give them space.
- Plows can't stop quickly. Keep your distance to stay safe.
- Snow clouds from plows can obscure your view—maintain a safe following distance.
- Be careful of ridges or bumps left behind, especially when changing lanes.

Important: Never pass a snow plow—For the safety of you, the snow plow driver, and any others on the road!

Sidewalk PLOW Service





The City operates one sidewalk plow, staffed by a full-time Motor Equipment Operator who begins plowing at 3am. Priority is given to school zones, followed by main streets, and it typically takes 2–3 days to complete these routes.


We kindly ask residents to remain patient during periods of heavy snowfall as the operator works through these areas.


DAVE JONES

November 5, 2025, the On Common Council adopted Resolution 25-195, eliminating the daily license option for Mobile Food Vendors. All vendors operating in the City must now obtain an annual license for \$150. This license is valid from January 1 through December 31, 2026, and covers all special events, including Fall Fest.

SHAKO:WI CULTURAL CENTER






