TO OUR COMMUNITY

Introduction

This report describes the activities of the Oneida Community Cats Committee for the calendar year 2025. The Oneida Community Cats Committee is a Trap Neuter Return program and operates as a subcommittee of the Oneida Improvement Committee (OIC).

The OIC was first incorporated in 1992 as a 501(c)(4) tax-exempt social welfare organization and was reorganized in 2012 as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization for the purpose of improving the lives of City of Oneida residents.

The Oneida Community Cats Committee is an all-volunteer group comprised of local community members who came together in 2021 because of their mutual interest in finding a way to address the community cat problem in the City of Oneida. Trap Neuter Return(TNR) is the only scientifically proven, evidence-based, humane, and effective approach to community cat population control.

Mission and Goals

Mission:

The mission of the Oneida Community Cats Committee is to work with compassionate individuals, local governments, veterinary professionals, community members and other volunteers to achieve population decline of the unaltered, free-roaming, feral, and/or abandoned domestic cats (“community cats”) in our area through education and the use of a humane Trap/Neuter/Return (TNR) program.

Goals:

1. Assist in creating a long-term community commitment to, and achievement of, the reduction of the local free roaming “community cat” population.
2. Reduction of the occurrence of nuisance behaviors associated with mating, including spraying, yowling, and fighting so that people and cats can live in harmony.
3. Find ways to support a successful TNR Program by gaining financial support in the form of fundraisers, grants, and contribution/support from local governments.
4. Promote humane treatment, and community understanding that “community cats” are victims of circumstance, deserve care and kindness, and provide a valuable public service in rodent control.
5. Aide in the community education and definition of what a “community cat” is. “Community Cats” is a term used to describe outdoor, unowned, free-roaming cats. These cats can be friendly, feral, adults, kittens, healthy, sick, altered and/or unaltered.
6. Promote unity through education. Support and encourage participation from community members, other animal support groups, veterinarians, and local government so that there is a clear understanding of the success that can be achieved through the operation of a strong Trap/Neuter/Return program.
7. Assist in the improvement of quality of life for homeless cats and kittens by creating an identification system to rate whether kittens or altered cats can be adopted, and coordinate with local fostering and adoption programs to support adoption.
8. Work with local governments to provide education, research, and data to assist in the prevention of future generations of “community cats.”

2025 Operations Summary

We experienced another extremely productive year between not only our Trap Neuter Return trapping activities, but with fundraising, continuing community education and engagement processes, and various committee-related tasks that kept our small core group very active. We continued to make significant strides in all areas.

We impacted over 130 cats this year. This does not include the fact that with every cat Spayed or Neutered the Reproduction Cycle that occurs with each cat is halted.

Highlights include:

- Our accomplishments would not be possible without the veterinary groups that we work with. We successfully expanded our veterinarian connections this year as we experienced a local lull in appointment availability early in the trapping season.

We coordinated efforts with the Spay Neuter SAVE Network in Rome PA. While this is a distance away it was worth it. 27 cats were TNR'ed in 3 visits to this clinic.

We also were granted the opportunity to participate in a clinic in Lowville offered by FARVETS where 5 cats were TNR'ed.

We continued to work with Creekside Veterinary Clinic, Fayetteville Veterinary Clinic, Village Veterinary Hospital and Paris Hill Hospital.

Some of our members have continued to volunteer at the Spay Neuter clinic at CNY Snap in Cortland, building another ally.

- Our TNR trapping dates continue to be dependent on vet appointment availability, volunteer availability for trapping/transport/fostering, and safe weather conditions.
- Special Thank you to Val and The Eclectic Chic for your steadfast support of our efforts from allowing us to run our fundraising booth, helping us with other fundraising projects, saving returnable bottles and booth donations, and generally supporting us to reach our goals.
- Appreciation and gratitude to the organizers of Catstock for all that you do to support the cats in Oneida and surrounding communities, and for your generous donation to us from last year's event.
- There continues to be a high level of community interest and involvement. Several residents have taken an active role in the trapping process, as well as fostering cats, helping to find homes for their colony cats, and offering general support. This has allowed us to further strengthen our program.
- Residents from other communities continue to reach out to us for guidance and support.
- We have also successfully worked with other local animal advocacy groups to foster and rehome several adoptable community kittens and cats. This has allowed us to continue to expand our networking ability.
- Fundraising activities continued this year as detailed in the financials.

- There have been several cat food donations this year that we have helped to distribute to those feeding the colonies.
- A tracking sheet of all known colony information continues to be maintained, and we utilize this to plan our trapping locations. Trapping is all coordinated with the homeowners and communicated with the neighbors.
- We keep an online shared photo album of all cats that go to the vet, labeled with the date, location, and vet. This helps us to track our efforts.
- All veterinary invoices, fundraising activities, and donations are tracked and retained by the committee.
- Monthly meetings still do generally occur and we keep minutes of the meetings. Meetings are open to the public and you are encouraged to attend. They are typically on the 3rd Monday of the month at 6 PM at the Oneida Library. We maintain regular communication amongst the active group members regarding day-to-day operations and other pertinent committee topics.
- All “cat releases” are videotaped and we share the majority of those on our Facebook page.
- The committee is responsible for trap maintenance: repairs, cleaning, and safe storage.
- We have been contacted during unfortunate instances of lost pets in the area. We not only provide guidance but communicate with those in the area to help spread the word and help with trapping when indicated. While unfortunately not always successful, we have helped many cats come home.
- Our ongoing active member recruitment efforts continue.

- Several personal and business donations from within the community, as well as some from out of state.

➤ Fundraising

- Eclectic Chic Sales Booth -\$2688.61- sales comprised of donations from the community.
- Participation with the Cat Stock Fundraiser- \$5500 check received. Also \$236 in merchandise sales from our table.
- Oneida Fall Fest- Sales and donations: \$75
- Cans for Cats program- \$ 579.80 -Ongoing fundraiser. This program was significantly boosted starting in 2024 because the Eclectic Chic volunteered to be a drop-off site, and they donate all incoming bottles to us. Bottles and Cans can be returned to the Redemption Center in the Northside Plaza, and they can be requested to be credited to our account.
- Got Sneakers Fundraiser- this is an ongoing fundraiser. Donation bins are located at: The Gorman Center on the Northside, the Oneida Municipal Building, The YMCA, The Village Veterinary Clinic, the Presbyterian Church, and the Oneida High School.
- Donation jars- this is an ongoing fundraiser. The jars are labeled and located at: The Eclectic Chic (2), Better Hearing, and Luso's Bakery at this time.

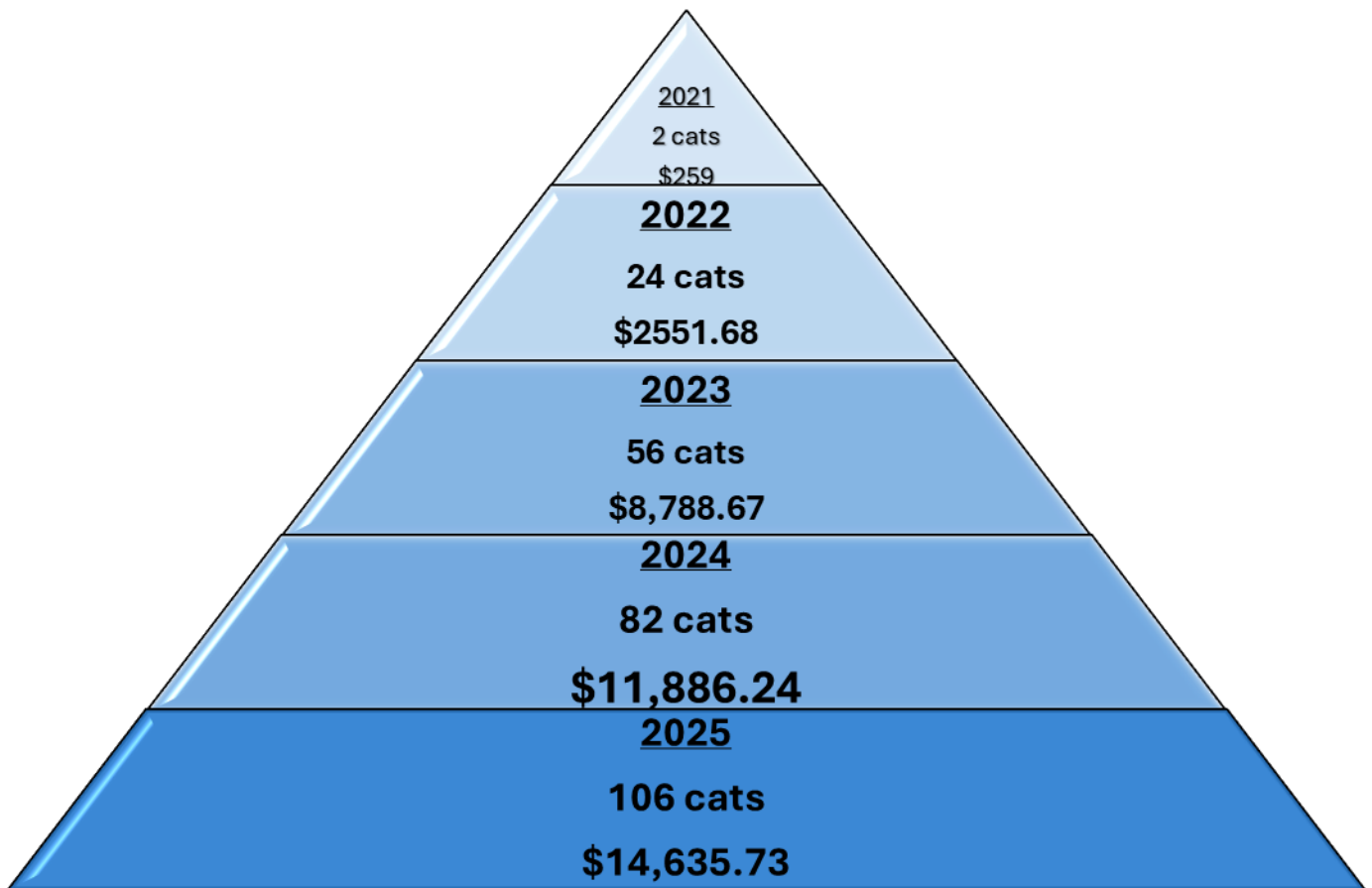
